## **II. OUR SCHOOL**

### **Brief Introduction of the School**

Canossa College, the former Canossian Convent Secondary School, was founded by the Canossian Daughters of Charity in 1959. The Canossian sisters left Italy, their homeland, to begin their missionary work in Hong Kong in 1860. In 1891, on Mr. David Sasson's generous donation of a piece of land of 3,000 sq.ft in Shau Kei Wan, the Canossian Sisters' convent and a Chinese primary school were built. In 1932, a new convent and a primary school were erected but were occupied by the Japanese and British soldiers during World War II. In 1951, the Canossian Chinese Primary School was re-opened and the Canossian Convent Secondary School was run in the new four-storey premises adjacent to the primary section in 1959.

To make way for the development of Eastern district, both the secondary and primary schools were relocated to the present premises in Quarry Bay in 1984 and renamed Canossa College and the primary, Canossa School (Hong Kong). Canossa College began to offer an education in the medium of English.

The Incorporated Management Committee (IMC) of Canossa College was set up on 31 August 2013 to replace the School Management Committee.

### **School Premises and Facilities**


The school premises not only won the 1984 Highest Honours Award in Architectural Design for its simplicity, harmonious colour scheme, brightness and spaciousness, but also provide an ideal learning environment for students. The School Improvement Programme was completed in 2004 with a new wing erected from the parking area by the main entrance, providing more facilities for students' learning.

There are now 25 classrooms and 20 special rooms (2 visual arts rooms, a computer room, a STEM room, a multi-media learning centre, 4 laboratories, 5 multi-purpose rooms, a needlework room, a cookery room, a geography room, a music room, an English Learning Centre and a student activity center). In addition, the school hall, library, tuck shop, backyard, two multi-purpose ball courts, two covered playgrounds (with air-conditioning system) and the chapel provide ample space for various student activities.



## Lesson Time for the 8 Key Learning Areas








## Percentage of S3 students promoting to S4







## V. MAJOR CONCERNS (ACHIEVEMENTS AND REFLECTION)

### Major Concern 1: Students develop positive values and attitudes towards life

#### Achievements

#### To strengthen students' positive values and attitudes

As Values Education was one of the school's priorities this year, the Values Education Committee was set up to oversee the formal and non-formal curriculum development in the school. To equip teachers with professional knowledge to implement values education, related seminars and workshops were conducted for all teachers. A joint-school seminar discussing the adaptation and implementation of values education was held for middle managers of six Canossian secondary schools.

The school implemented values education in different subjects and through cross-curriculum learning to instill positive values into our students and promote the development of important generic skills. It was hoped that students could thus enjoy whole-person development and possess right values concerning individual, family, society, nation and the world. For instance, aligning with the educational theme, the Chinese Language department highlighted two of the distinguished values, love and willingness to serve, in some of the teaching units in order to encourage our students to show care and serve people in need.

The school strived to develop students' positive values and attitudes through various activities such as talks, workshops, leadership training programs, life-planning activities, as well as inter-class and class-based activities. Several activities, including an interactive drama, an ICAC quiz, and the ICAC Campus Hunt were held in cooperation with ICAC to highlight the importance of integrity to our junior form students. Student participation was keen in the activities. About 80% of students admitted that these activities could develop their healthy mindset and enhance their character strengths.

The Career Guidance Committee was dedicated to preparing our students for future challenges. To foster self-awareness and guide participants toward a fulfilling career path, F.3 students gained a better understanding of their inherent traits and strengths through various personality and ability assessments in different seminars and workshops. Having a good self-understanding is the first step of making informed career choices. Additionally, the school offered talks featuring professionals from diverse fields, giving students insights into various occupations and industries. Such activities allowed students to identify possible career choices that could suit their unique abilities and interests. By participating in these activities, students would be better equipped to make career decisions that resonate with their skills and aspirations. Most students who took part in these programs commented that the activities effectively enhanced their understanding of potential career paths.

To encourage a more proactive attitude towards career planning, a series of activities were carefully planned to cater for the needs of our senior form students and invite students to take initiative in shaping their own future. For example, the school offered guidance on self-learning portfolio, encouraging them to plan more strategically for their career development. Likewise, the mock HKDSE Result Release Workshop served as an opportunity to promote active self-improvement and goal-setting. In one of the interview training workshops, not only did they acquire good interview skills, but they also learnt to see job-seeking as an opportunity of personal growth and fulfilling their personal aspirations. Alumnae were also invited to give inspiring and practical career advice in multiple sharing sessions. All the above-mentioned activities were interactive and engaging. Participants were positive about the activities and reportedly said that they felt more in control of their future careers.

The Student Support Team also spared no effort in helping students explore their potentials. An array of activities, such as career-related workshops and visits to different workplaces, were organized. Most participants agreed that such activities had broadened their horizon and improved their awareness of individual strengths and weaknesses.

The Counseling & Guidance Committee organized a lot of activities, such as the "VASK in life exploration" class-based workshop and "Shall we talk" class-based workshop, to reinforce positive values among students. To cater for students' growth needs, the committee joined the 'Mindshift'

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programme, which was organized by the Education Bureau and the Department of Psychiatry of the University of Hong Kong to promote positive life outlook in schools. Online seminars and joint-school sharing sessions were conducted for teachers so that teachers could help enhance students' sense of well-being and self-management skills. 12 student ambassadors from F.3 & F.4 were recruited in the programme. They shared positive messages with their schoolmates via Instagram and prepared cheer-up packages for all F.6 students in March on campus to show support. The Add Oil Week was held before the final exam to allow students to rewind and relax during lunch break by participating in stress-relieving activities. NGOs were invited to hold workshops on campus and student helpers were recruited to serve at the game booths.

To enhance students' resilience, the school social workers conducted class visits throughout the school year. Problem-solving skills were introduced to F.1-F.3 students to improve their capacity of overcoming difficulties in daily life. A Nagomi Pastel Art workshop and stress relief workshops were organised for senior form students to relax and 97% of participants agreed that the purpose was achieved.

To enhance students' sense of national identity, the Civic Education Committee coordinated flagraising ceremonies every Monday, on important days, and for special school events. There were national security education exhibitions in school throughout the year. 12 students from our school participated in the Constitution and Basic Law Student Ambassadors Training Scheme organized by the Education Bureau. School-based activities, such as the booth games promoting Chinese culture, the National Security inter-class quiz, and a visit to the Court of Final Appeal, were held to promote national security and enhance students' sense of national identity. All activities were successfully held and it was observed that all students showed great respect and good discipline while attending the events. To provide students with more opportunities to keep abreast of the latest developments of China, thus enriching students' knowledge and strengthening their sense of belonging to the country, some student leaders were invited to take part in the "Beijing - Hong Kong - Macau Student Exchange Summer Camp (2023)" and all F.5 students were required to join the Citizenship and Social Development Mainland Study Tour. Meanwhile, in order to enhance teachers' understanding of National Security Education, a joint-school national security education workshop was held. A talk on "Understanding of National Security Law, National Flag & National Anthem" was conducted for F.1 parents and students. The school was dedicated to assisting different stakeholders in establishing positive values and enhancing the sense of national identity of students and staff.

For students' good character formation, the Discipline Committee organized different educational campaigns and activities, such as Companion Chat, Courtesy Campaign and the interclass cleanliness competition, during the school year to encourage self-discipline and good behavior. As students were heavy internet users, a police talk and a workshop on the topic of social media and personal privacy were held to improve their awareness of internet safety as well as how they should behave online legally and appropriately. In the meantime, discipline prefects were recruited and given plenty of opportunities to serve the school and become role models for their peers.

All in all, 81% of students, as indicated in the student survey, agreed that activities, talks and workshops offered by the school had developed their healthy mindset and enhanced their character strengths.

#### To nurture Catholic core values and positive attitudes by actualizing the School Motto

The school has always strived to cultivate Catholic core values and the Canossian spirits among students inside and outside classrooms.

Cell groups were conducted for Catholic students and whole-school religious activities including the School Opening Liturgy, Christmas Mass and Thanksgiving Liturgy were held within the school year. In October and May, six Rosary prayer meetings were also conducted. Students and teachers participated in the Caritas Bazaar and served as the ambassadors of a charity sale booth. Students of different levels were responsible for giving speeches with themes related to the school motto (Humility, Respect, Kindness, and Love) and other positive values in the morning assemblies. 74% of students agreed that the lessons, morning assemblies, morning reading sessions and the abovementioned activities nurtured their Catholic core values and Canossian spirits. 86% of students were confident that they could always uphold the Canossian spirits: Humility, Respect, Kindness, and Love, through performing their duties in school.

In Life Education lessons, various learning materials focusing on the 24-character strengths were adopted in different forms. Goal setting and team-building activities at the beginning of the academic year were held successfully to foster good attitudes and class spirit. 85% of students responded that they had a strong sense of belonging to the class. 79% of the students and more than 90% of teachers claimed that students could strengthen their positive values and attitudes through Life Education lessons.

#### To encourage students to appreciate and give full play to their strengths

All students in school created artworks that aligned with the school's educational theme "Serve with heart and act with love". All of them were displayed on the school campus to help create a loving, graceful and caring atmosphere. Visitors were always impressed by such displays. Small gifts with thank-you notes on Teacher Appreciation Day were prepared by discipline prefects and the Parent-Teacher Association for all teaching and non-teaching staff to show gratitude for their dedication to work. More than 90% of teachers agreed that students always showed appreciation and gratitude to teachers, parents and staff members.

To strengthen students' positive values, the VIA cards (the 24-character strengths cards) were prepared for teachers to show appreciation and recognition to students. Teachers chose different cards related to students' character strengths and gave them encouragement. It was expected that upon knowing their own character strengths, students would enjoy greater well-being, give better performance and develop higher resilience.

The Parent-Teacher Association put much effort in promoting parental education and better family relationships. A one-day local trip was organised with great success. A talk titled "Make a Good Impression in 7 Seconds" was also well-received by parents and students. According to the evaluation form, all participants were satisfied with the arrangement of the activities.

#### To empower students to serve others with charity and humility

In line with the school educational theme, 'Serve with heart and act with love', the school endeavored to create a culture of positivity that would nurture students to become responsible, compassionate and humble members of society who are also ready to make contributions to their homeland and the world. Students were given many opportunities to take up leadership roles, such as Student Council, houses, different committees, and extracurricular activity groups. Talented students were recruited into a team for public speaking and leadership training. They also served as masters of ceremonies and ambassadors in different school events.

To develop students' leadership skills, 60 Discipline Prefects were recruited, and they served as role models for their schoolmates. They provided service to the school, helped promote self-discipline and create a safe and orderly learning environment on the campus. Leadership training activities were held and 90% of the participants strongly agreed that the activities strengthened their communication skills and enhanced their confidence.

To help F.1 students adapt to the new school environment, the Foster Prefects Scheme was launched. 46 students from F.4 to F.5 were recruited as mentors and 62 F.1 students joined the scheme as mentees. To provide additional learning support for F.1 students, tutorial classes of different subjects were organized. All the foster prefects agreed that their interpersonal communication skills were enhanced. 96.6% of F.1 students claimed that the scheme helped them adapt to the new school life. The Student Support Team also arranged activities to help F.1 students establish good learning habits and build good relationships with schoolmates.

#### Reflections

Different committees, whenever possible, seized opportunities to instill positive values and develop students' potential through various programmes and activities in school. Students always gave positive feedback for the activities they participated in. The school would continue to work hard to help our students shine. We believe that, in the next academic year, the 65<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Open Days would be an excellent occasion to engage all our students and explore their potential.

### Major Concern 2: Students are engaged and persistent in learning

## A. Students master lifelong learning skills and apply them to real-life situations Achievements

#### Integrate elements of E-learning and self-regulated learning into teaching and learning

With the pandemic coming to an end, it was believed that students could maximise their learning at school. They acquired knowledge and various skills with a greater access to resources at school and individual guidance from teachers. Teachers had refined learning tasks to engage students of various abilities in learning. The use of E-learning material also sparked interests in learning. According to the year-end survey, students were satisfied with their learning process with E-learning materials. Over 83% of them agreed the E-learning materials helped them in self-directed learning. Moreover, 72% of the respondents claimed they were well-prepared before lessons by completing the pre-lesson tasks.

## Equip students with the ability to identify their learning needs, set learning goals, select resources and devise strategies and plans for learning

To provide additional learning support to weaker students, teachers offered tutorial sessions after school. The rich variety of workshops and supplementary lessons offered in Chinese Language helped students in their exams. Students gave very positive feedback and there were requests for more sessions. There were also workshops focusing on teaching students analytical and writing skills in different levels. While catering for students who are less capable in Chinese, the team offered remedial courses to enhance the language foundation of the students. In other subject panels, teachers devised effective teaching strategies and offered notes to assist students in acquiring the most within limited time. With all the effective strategies taught, over 85% of the students said they had developed the habit of note-taking. Furthermore, over 87% of the students believed they had applied the subject knowledge learned in lessons into their daily lives.

## Cross-curricular collaboration in junior forms to encourage the application of knowledge to real-life situations

A number of subjects teamed up to formulate cross-curricular units for junior form students. Students created decorative items for Easter using the skills and knowledge acquired from Visual Arts and Home Economics. Religious and Moral Education worked with Chinese History panel and the library on a research project. Students were able to utilize skills in research, reflection and writing. Chinese Language, Putonghua and Physical Education panels also designed a creative project that required cooperation and language skills.

#### Reading activities and competitions in collaboration with the school library

Throughout the school year, the library implemented various reading award programs for students. Students were encouraged to read while book sharings and various reading workshop promotions were held during reading periods. Participants who read the most were rewarded, and they realized the importance of reading. According to the year-end survey, over 78% of the students believed reading can broaden their horizon.

In the new school year, the library will incorporate virtual reality technology into their book collection, so students can enjoy reading while exploring new technology at the same time.

#### Promote the spirit of inquiry and innovation among students

The STREAM Week was held between 2nd and 5th May. Students enjoyed a variety of innovative activities created by teachers from various departments. In Science, students learned to apply designs on a piece of metal by going through the process of metal etching. Students were satisfied with their own creations. In Visual Arts, students got the taste of marbling, a method of aqueous surface design which can produce patterns similar to smooth marble or other kinds of stone. In Music, students learned the sound and lighting design of a song through the newest lighting panel in the school hall. The musical stairs, from which students learned how technology can combine with Music, were set up next to the Music Room. Moreover, students learned to fly drones and shoot videos for various video productions.

#### Reflections

All teachers worked very hard to keep abreast of the latest trend of teaching and learning so that our students can benefit from new technologies in e-Learning.

### **B.** Students develop self-confidence in learning and realize their potential

#### Achievements

#### Implement different strategies to enhance students' confidence and motivation in learning

To arouse students' interest and enhance their motivation in English learning, the English Language department conducted a series of English learning activities throughout the school year. Hall events, including a musical, storytelling competition as well as a green fashion show, were held in the newly renovated school hall. English teachers spent enormous effort in preparing students for their delightful performances, while students were given ample opportunities to show their talents and practice their language skills. The shows amused the whole audience, and all participants agreed that out-of-classroom learning could benefit students hugely.

On the other hand, to provide students with additional learning support, the Chinese Language department held various enrichment programs for students. The aims of the programs were to hone students' public exam skills. Participating students feedbacked that the course improved their confidence in writing. In addition, remedial courses were conducted for F.1 students who needed support to build better foundation in core subjects.

#### Adopting different assessment modes

The addition of HKDSE question banks helped students to get familiarized with different question types and content from different subjects. Students were assigned individual accounts and they could complete the practices at their own pace. According to the year-end survey, over 82% of the students believed the question banks benefited their studies. Moreover, teachers could monitor students' progress and further elaborate on the questions which students have trouble with. Some subject panels created their own question banks. Furthermore, teachers made use of the results obtained from various assessments and conducted individual guidance sessions with students. Students receiving feedback from subject teachers showed improvements in their future assessments.

#### Unleash students' potential

Gifted students were offered various opportunities to join taster programs at different universities. A number of students participated in the programs and received valuable insights from the courses. Meanwhile, many students who participated in various external competitions received superior results. A number of students were awarded the Champion in competitions including the Hong Kong Schools Speech Festivals, Music Festivals, arts competitions and sports competitions. Students were devoted to these competitions so they had spent precious time preparing for the events. With a new week-day timetable in place starting in the academic year 2023-2024, students will gain the opportunity to participate in joint-school programs and interact with other students in the city.

On the other hand, the English Team held a musical production during the post-exam period. The musical, which involved students from various levels, was a great success. The audience appreciated the acting and the songs from the production while the participants immersed themselves into the show. Students participating in the musical rewarded themselves with experience in script writing, backstage organization, sound effect production and lighting control. The performances received thunderous applause from parents, teachers and students. The event, which involved the effort from different personnel, provided a perfect stage for students to showcase their effort and talent.

#### Reflections

The addition of new programs into the curriculum significantly raised the interest of students in learning.

# C. Students and teachers improve the efficiency of teaching and learning with e-learning tools

#### Achievements

#### Make use of different e-Learning platforms to facilitate teaching and learning

The implementation of the BYOD policy went exceptionally well. Students from F.1 to F.5 are now equipped with a tablet suitable for e-Learning during lessons. The school also set out guidelines for students to use their tablet as a proper learning tool during school hours.

Subject panels kept exploring various Apps that were useful in teaching. Moreover, students learned subject matter easier with the assistance of the Apps.

The IMSC Team organized workshops on various e-Learning platforms. Students and teachers were familiar with Google Classroom, which unfortunately had its own deficiencies. A couple of workshops on Microsoft OneNote were conducted on the Staff Development Day. Teachers learned new ways to organize and distribute lesson material to students. The new platform offered some useful functions while students could access the online classroom and conduct self-directed learning. Most importantly, the platform could serve as an alternative to Google Classroom.

Further to the implementation of e-Learning, various subject teachers conducted a lesson demonstration regarding e-Learning for other colleagues. The sharings were conducted throughout the year, teachers and students were benefited from the practice which promoted the culture of self-directed learning. Besides, over 82% of the students claimed they were more engaged in lessons when e-Learning was applied.

#### Reflections


The proper tools and e-Learning skills were in place for our teachers and students so that both parties could enjoy the teaching and learning process to its fullest.


## 1. HKDSE Results 2023

Percentage of students attaining (3322+2) or above to meet the general entrance requirements for the first-degree courses in tertiary institutions



Comparison of HKDSE results of Canossa College and HK day schools candidates in 2023 with Level 4 or above






## VIII. FUTURE PLANNING 2023-2024

The school year 2023-2024 marks the third year of the school development cycle 2021-2024. The educational theme for 2023-2024 is "Cherish Grace Avow Mercy Nurture Love". After having been taught the importance of the virtues of gratitude, respect and responsibility, we would like to encourage our students to love their peers, family members and everyone around them. In preaching Catholic values to our students, teachers shall demonstrate the willingness and passion to serve, by setting good examples for students to learn as well as giving them the opportunities to serve. While working on the new theme, the Courtesy Campaign will be held in school to highlight and encourage students' good and modest behaviour. It is our ultimate goal that students can experience every aspect of their school life with positive values and attitudes towards life.

The school will carry out various strategies to address the second major concern, "Students are engaged and persistent in learning". E-learning will remain one of our foci. Students will be engaged interactively in face-to-face lessons with iPads. Teachers may conduct lessons with useful apps accordingly, making learning more efficient than before. Instant feedback on students' work can be provided. In addition, students may demonstrate their learning outcomes with the help of an iPad that allows various assessment modes. We also aim to provide more programmes and alternatives for our students according to their interests and needs. Also, the school will continue to implement STEM education in junior forms, refining the curriculum to ignite students' interest in science and technology. Meanwhile, students will be given the opportunities to explore language arts and communication in English to improve their language skills and learn the subject in various ways. To this end, a new timetable will be implemented, so that with adjustment of lesson time, new programme combinations and arrangements would be made possible, and students may be benefited.

The school is going to celebrate its 65<sup>th</sup> anniversary in the school year 2023-2024. We see this as an excellent opportunity to organize a series of meaningful celebratory events, namely the Open Days in March 2024, in which students can serve as ambassadors and develop their qualities while working with their teachers and peers. Given the precious chance to showcase their talents and serve the others, students are expected to have their sense of belonging to the school enhanced, boost their confidence and gain a sense of achievement simultaneously.
