SCHOOL-BASED MOI POLICY

In the school year 2025-26, our school will continue to adopt English as the medium of instruction for all forms, except for the following subjects: Chinese Language, Chinese Literature, Chinese History, Physical Education (F.3-6), Putonghua, Religious & Moral Education and Visual Arts (Senior Secondary).

Rationales

- 1. To provide our students with more opportunities to be exposed to, and use English at all levels.
- 2. To enhance our students' ability to learn through English and to better prepare them for further studies and work in the future.
- 3. The school has fulfilled the three prescribed criteria set out in the Report on Review of Medium of Instruction by the Education Commission in 2005:
 - a. Students possess the ability to learn through English;
 - b. Teachers possess the capability to teach through English; and
 - c. The school has adequate support strategies / measures.
